### Strengths

- History/tradition
  - Older club

- Location
  - Present venue & location of the club meeting is good and well recognized.
- Historic project significance
  - Club foot project at Gaibandha (in Friendship Hospital)
  - Medical Camp on Heart disease and Eye operation
  - Support for a wide variety of needy charities

### Weaknesses

- Very small in size (in aspect of number of membership, specially number of Female)
- Difficulty of creating close bonds
- Lack of hands-on engagement.
- Members have less flexibility in using their time

## Opportunities

- History gives the club greater leverage to bring in top speakers and important community leaders to build strong weekly programs.
- Younger members come with impressive backgrounds and energy. Useful to club growth and dynamism if tapped into. Exploit the new generation culture and digital orientation, seeing it as an opportunity, not as a barrier.
- Project visibility and impact can be improved. Might demand change of project model and emphasis.

### Strategy: What We Intend To Do?

Strengthen the bonds among members and focus our local and global projects on a few themes that clearly identify our club's direction to the community and Rotary International. Build a sustainable membership that grows each year and comprises both recognized community leaders and younger members who have shown the potential to be leaders in their respective fields.

### Strategic themes: How We Will Make It Happen

- Encourage deepening of member Rotary knowledge through participation in Rotary Leadership Institute sessions and other district and Rotary International training programs.
- Sustain the club's vitality through aggressive and balanced membership recruitment. Incorporate strategies that will keep new members engaged. Increase membership to 30 members by the end of the 2023-24 Rotary Year.

## **GOALS FOR RY 2021-22**

### Building better bonds among members

- Minimum 4 family dinner will be hosted In Rotary year 2021-22 (with spouse and children as applicable)
- A "one dish" party will be arranged where each Rotarian will bring one dish (any item for dinner) from their home

### · Increase attendance at weekly meetings

- Average 60% or greater attendance throughout the Rotary Year.
- Track those who are missing many meetings and reach out to get them back
- The club will organize minimum 4 joint meetings with different Rotary Club to build better fellowship with the members of other Rotary Clubs
- Guest speakers will be invited in regular weekly meetings to speech on a specific topic and share some new knowledge
- Rotarian from other clubs and non-Rotarian guests will also be invited to make some extra attraction in some meetings
- Celebration of Birthdays and Marriage anniversaries of each and every member
- Fun program will be in a part of maximum meetings. Professional talk will be another interesting subject
- President is very interested to keep a mini cultural session (song, recitation, jokes, storytelling etc.)

### Increase RI Foundation giving

- 100% members will give at least a minimum amount of funds (Expecting \$ 100)
- Increase Paul Harris Fellow by 10 members during the 2021-22 Rotary Year
- Increase donations or project funding by organizing a fundraising event, such as cultural evening

### Increasing online presence

- The President's Challenge: 100% of club members will have active account in Rotary Central by June 2022.
- Enhance the use of Facebook to record/ update member's events. By the end of 2021-22, ensure that at least 100% of members have Facebook IDs and are connected to the club Facebook page.

### Increase service project and engagement of members in club activities

- At least 12 significant projects in 12 months. Target to engage different members in different projects. Aim to organize few joint projects with other clubs.
- Special attention on committee activity
- Appointment of newer and younger members to more significant positions.
- Seek broader member participation in hands-on activities

#### Review Club By-Laws by end of March, 2022

- Start with side-by-side comparison of Club documents and Rotary International guidelines
- Board discussion, review and approval of changes.
- Recommend adoption to the membership.
